A summary of our year supporting the autism community in the Regional Municipality of Wood Buffalo.

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President's Report

2018 has been an extremely busy and exciting year for our Society. We are thrilled to announce we received our charity status in April 2018, which has created many more opportunities for our society.

Grants/Funding

Thanks to the hard work of our board members we have received three grants this year; one of which was The Community Investment Program which has allowed us to hire an employee as a Community Ambassador. This allows us to continue to have an employee in the office and out in the community educating parents, professionals, and other organizations and helping navigate services provided in our community.

The second grant, Wood Buffalo Community Foundation, gives us an opportunity to hire a second employee that will create and facilitate a pilot social-respite program. This is a program that we feel will greatly benefit our community and fill a gap in services identified by parents of youth aged 11-17yrs.

The third grant, from Unity for Autism, will enable us to run our camp for 2 extra weeks which will extend it from 3 weeks to 5 weeks in 2019. This will allow us to reduce the waiting list and give more special needs children the opportunity to experience summer camp.

After a detailed application process we will be holding our very first casino event in July 2019; all funds raised will be used to further develop our programs.

Community Partners

Through a coalition with Support 4 Moms Society and The Boys and Girls Club we helped create and facilitate K-SNAP, which is a fully inclusive program focusing on peer play and adaptive sports. K-SNAP gives children the opportunity to interact with other kids in a semi-structured setting that promotes forming cooperative relationships and exploring different sports and games that are adapted to their needs. This is a great opportunity for parents to experience play with their children, and to watch them learn social skills and how to play with others.

Education and Awareness

Over the last year we've held many engagement and information sessions for families, educators and others in the community interested in learning more about autism. The following are the sessions we've had in 2018:

- Financial Planning
- A Spectrum Talk Living with ASD
- Let's Talk Respite
- Understanding and Managing Challenging Behaviors
- Annual Autism Conference webcast

Sensory-Friendly Events and Programs

We work hard for families to come together socially in the RMWB, in a sensory friendly environment. Some of the amazing sensory-friendly events we have been able to provide our families with are; tubing at Vista Ridge, our annual Easter Egg Hunt at Dunvegan Gardens, Sensory Holiday photos at Peter Pond Mall, sensory-friendly Paint Time at Color Me Mine and weekly sensory-friendly Jump Time at Aim High Trampoline Park. New this year we held Family Picnic in the Park throughout the summer months, Fall Family Fun Night and our annual Christmas party which is always a favourite with our families!

In April we held our annual Autism Toonie Swim to raise awareness on autism in our community.

Even though we were unable to hold our autism awareness gala this year, we were still able to put on a successful comedy night at Live Bar and Grill and raise much needed funds for the Society.

Challenges in 2018

Although we have had such a successful year in some ways, there have been a few challenges as well, which include reaching and engaging adults on the spectrum in the community. This is something we will work towards in the next year.

At the end of 2018 the Board made the difficult decision to remove ourselves from the More Than Just Bricks campaign with Educare. Unfortunately, as the campaign progressed it became

apparent that our visions were not aligned, and the Society decided that at this time we would like to continue to develop and grow our own programs within the community. As a Society we wish Educare only the best for the campaign and their future endeavors.

A major highlight for the society this year was our nomination of The Heart of Wood Buffalo Leadership Award. Although we did not receive the award, being nominated with so many other amazing organizations in this community was truly a great honour.

We sincerely thank all our board members and volunteers. We all worked countless hours to make the last year so successful. This society has achieved so much because of you all!

2019 is going to be another busy and exciting year as we continue to provide supports and education in the community, raise awareness in our region and create and facilitate new programs for our families.

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Ambassador's Report

2018 brought some changes to the existing ambassador program. As the Community Services Grant provided by Autism Speaks came to an end in May of 2018 the need to sustain and continue the programs and services of the ambassador role were strongly evident. It was identified that the services of the board as well as the community relations portion of the role required consistent hours that would make the office and ambassador available during regular business hours. We received the Community impact Grant from the Regional Municipality of Wood Buffalo in August 2018 to continue to employee an Ambassador for 25hrs each week to include regular office hours.

With the creation of the new hours and additional availability of the ambassador the society now had the capacity to work towards meeting the objectives and priorities identified in the strategic plan.

- Develop consistent program that will provide current and credible information to families, individuals and professionals on a monthly basis.
- Complete the Missing Pieces Project.
- Create and grow a program for adults in our community.
- Increase an interest in our board by increasing awareness on what we do and growing members and volunteers.

Accomplishments

- Created strong inter agency relationships with local agencies and groups that will benefit the growth and function of the society.
- Formed a partnership with Fort McMurray Boys and Girls club and Support 4 Moms Society to create and run KSNAP, a fully inclusive social program focusing on peer play and adaptive sports.
- Became an active member of both the Y-Connect and ASSESTS in Action inter-agency committees.
- Built strong working relationship with agencies in other areas of Alberta (Autism Edmonton, Autism Calgary and Autism Society Alberta), giving us the opportunity to be a part of a large stakeholder event as a panel speaker, invited to the Ministry of Education to be a part of policy and guideline discussions. We have showcased our resources (Missing Piece) and have been asked to share our vision and material for the program as there is currently nothing like this in Alberta.
- Connected to University of Calgary and a multitude of study opportunities as well as collaborated grant possibilities with the agencies.

- Have completed the Missing Pieces Program lending resource program that is now available to schools.
- The society now has the beginning of a training library (slide shows, workshops and presentations) we have begun awareness presentation and educational presentation in the community since September.
- With the increase of regular hours, we have seen an increase in parent and individual outreach for advice, services and support. The ambassador program has been able to offer parent support and navigation by providing one on one supports either in person, on the phone or via email. We have advocated for and with parents at schools and with program providers to assist them with feeling they and their child were receiving equitable supports and opportunities.
- Attended 20 + community markets promoting the board, raising awareness and showcasing our sensory items.
- In November, we began to outline and develop an adult program. Outreach has begun with agencies and current service providers to begin to see the wants and needs of the adults in our community. Once the gaps are identified we will develop a support and service for the needs of this demographic.

Next Steps

Over the next year the Ambassador Program will continue to focus on providing the supports and services outlined above and using the resources created with the inter-agency relationships to grow the network of service and supports in the community for our clients. We will strive to be a strong part of the reorganization and revitalization of the Regional Inclusive Committee in 2019.

Challenges

Funding for this program continues to be a challenge. Creating sustainability for the program will be a focus. Sourcing funding for programs supplies, speakers, venues and staff will be a priority in 2019.

Camp Kids First Report

Camp Kids First is a summer day camp for children with autism and other disabilities and disorders in our region. Campers participate in activities that promote social skills, play and communication.

Camp Kids First ran for three weeks during the summer of 2018 and thirty-eight children were able to attend with one-to-one support. Camp was based at Educare, a local preschool and campers enjoyed daily field trips in our local community. Some of the places they visited were; Clearwater Horse Club, Aerial Adventure Park at Vista Ridge, MacDonald Island, Fire Hall #1, Gregoire Lake and Dunvegan Gardens.

Camp was funded by – grant from Northeast Alberta Children and Family Services and fundraising efforts. The grant paid for the Director and Co-Director to plan and supervise camp. The Autism Society of the Regional Municipality of Wood Buffalo received a donation from Servus Credit Union which covered the cost of the children attending the Aerial Adventure Park at Vista Ridge.

Each child had a one-to-one support worker provided by McMan Child and Youth Services, Fort McMurray and funded by Family Supports for Children with Disabilities.

Some comments from parents of the children who attended Camp Kids First in 2018:

"the location was great, lots of things to do there, playground right in there was nice, hope that every year camp can be there"

"camp needs to be longer"

"loved having Facebook group and receiving updates and pics from camp!"

"Vista Ridge Aerial Adventure Park was my child's favourite"

"my son, he didn't want to leave"

"wish camp was longer than one week"

"I can't believe my son touched a horse!"




VOLUNTEER COORDINATOR REPORT
